HARASSMENT AND/OR BULLYING OF STUDENTS OR STAFF

411.1

Harassment and/or bullying of students will not be tolerated in the Hayward Community School District, which includes any property or vehicles owned, leased or used by the schools. The School Board considers these actions to be detrimental to the health and safety of students and disruptive to the educational environment.

The educational environment is defined as consisting of every activity under the supervision of each school. For purposes of this policy, harassment and/or bullying are defined as any conscious, willful, or deliberate act or attempted act, through the use of words or actions which are intended to cause physical injury, emotional distress/suffering or property damage or which impact the learning environment.

Harassment and/or bullying could include acts motivated by, but not limited to, hostility toward the victim's real or perceived sex, race, color, religion, national origin, ancestry, creed, pregnancy, marital status, sexual orientation, gender identity, social socio-economic or family status, physical attributes, disability/handicap or any other basis protected by state or federal law. Examples of acts of harassment and/or bullying include physical intimidation, force or assault, humiliation, bigoted epithets, vandalism, extortion, oral or written threats, taunting, put downs, name calling, threatening looks or gestures, false accusations, social isolation, retaliating against another student for reporting harassment or bullying, or any other behavior that substantially interferes with a student's school performance or creates an intimidating, hostile or offensive school environment.

All forms of harassment in cyberspace commonly referred to as cyber bullying are unacceptable and viewed as a violation of this policy. Cyber bullying includes but is not limited to the following misuses of technology: harassment, teasing, intimidating, threatening, or terrorizing another person or group of people by sending or posting inappropriate and hurtful e-mail messages, instant messages, text messages, digital pictures or images, or website postings, including blogs or any other messages via cyberspace. For purposes of this policy, "cyberspace" is defined as a global domain within the information environment consisting of the interdependent network of information technology infrastructures, including the Internet, telecommunications networks, computer systems, and embedded processors and controllers.

In situations in which cyber bullying originated off school property or from a non-school computer or telecommunication device, but is brought to the attention of school officials, any disciplinary action shall be based upon whether the conduct is determined to be severely disruptive of the educational process so that it markedly impedes the day to day operations of a school. Such conduct includes, but is not limited to, harassment, bullying or making a threat off school grounds through cyberspace that is intended to endanger the health, safety or property of others at school.

Any student who believes he/she has been subject to harassment and/or bullying may file a report in accordance with established report procedures or may report directly to the building principal or designee or the District Equity Coordinator. Filing a report or otherwise reporting harassment and/or bullying in good faith will not reflect upon the individual's status nor will it affect his/her grades or benefits provided by the District. The District shall respect the confidentiality of both the student reporting and the accused consistent with the District's legal obligations and with the necessity to investigate allegations of misconduct and to take corrective and/or disciplinary action when this conduct has occurred.

Any student or parent/guardian who becomes aware of or witnesses harassment and/or bullying has an obligation to report and will be supported by involved staff members in reporting the bullying/harassment to the proper authorities. Any District employee who becomes aware of or witnesses harassment and/or bullying has an obligation to intervene and report.

Students who engage in harassment and/or bullying in violation of this policy and/or retaliating against an individual for reporting harassment and/or bullying shall be subject to school disciplinary measures consistent with District policies and procedures up to and including suspension and/or expulsion.

The Superintendent will develop administrative rules to implement this policy.

Notice of this policy will be circulated to all schools and departments in the District on an annual basis and incorporated in employee and student handbooks. It will also be distributed to all organizations in the community having cooperative agreements with the public schools. Failure to comply with this policy may result in termination of the cooperative agreement.



If you need to pick up your child during school hours, you must come to the office. Teachers are not allowed to release children from school.

Parents must sign out their child. Only people listed on the child's emergency card (that parents have completed during enrollment) may pick up a child.

School Attendance

When your child is absent from school, please call your child's school office and let them know the reason for the absence. You may call anytime and leave a voice message; phones are on 24 hours a day. It is very helpful to call before 8:30 a.m. You must call every day your child is absent unless the absence has been prearranged.

School Bus Information

Bus service is available to all students who live outside a safe walking distance to their school. More than 35 buses cover the 622 square miles that comprise the Hayward Community School District. This includes the communities of Hayward, Seeley, Stone Lake, Reserve, New Post and all rural areas within the district. All students are potential bus riders. Important School Closing Information

On rare occasions school may start late or be closed due to severe weather conditions or other emergencies. We attempt to inform parents/guardians as quickly as possible.

Hayward School District has implemented a phone system that will call every family in the district when the school has to close for any reason. You must have a current phone number on file to receive these calls. School closing announcements are also posted on the school website at www.hayward.k12.wi.us.

Weather may turn bad during the day. If that situation arises, school may be closed early. When this happens it usually takes 1½ hours from the time the decision is made until bus departure time. Please listen to the local radio stations for this information or check the website.

Please do not call the school.

This information will be made available to you as soon as a decision has been made.

Prepare your child for an emergency school closing situation. We ask parents/ guardians to discuss emergency transportation in advance so that your children know what to do in case of an early dismissal (i.e. telling the child where he/she should go if you are not at home).

School Breakfast and Lunch Program

The Hayward Community School District implemented a food service program managed by Chartwells School Dining Service with the 2010-2011 school year. The food service program complies with all guidelines for the National School Breakfast/ Lunch program. Each day students will select from several items offered to make up a school lunch. Each student will select at least three and up to five different components daily. The components that will be offered will be protein, fruit, vegetable, fruit, bread/grain and milk.

The students at the Primary School and Intermediate School will choose from 2-3 reimbursable (type A) entrée choices daily. In addition they will also select from two fruit choices (with one fresh fruit offered daily), vegetable, bread and milk.

The students at the Middle/High Schools will choose from 6-9 reimbursable entrée choices daily. In addition, they will select from a variety of fruit and vegetables choices, as well as a grain and milk.

Because the reimbursable (type A) lunches are nutritionally balanced and tailored to comply with USDA requirements, your children will be receiving the nourishment their bodies need.

The Middle and High School also offer ala carte items to students. Prices for these items vary and the cost of these items can be deducted from the student's lunch account. Students may not purchase ala carte if the account balance is negative.

The district uses a computerized food service program to record payments, purchases and account balances for each student. Each student has his/her own lunch number and this number is entered each time they purchase lunch or breakfast. Money is deposited into a family account. If a parent has more than one child in the district there is no need to send separate checks or make separate deposits.

Checks must include the student's name, building, account number and the amount to be applied to that account and should be made payable to Hayward Community School District. Deposits may be made weekly, monthly, each semester, or yearly into the account at any building or through the mail. Payments can also be automatically withdrawn electronically from your checking account or charged to your credit card at any time. Visit **Electronic Payments** at **www.hayward.k12.wi.us**.

All lunches must be prepaid or paid for daily. Charges will not be accepted. Students and parents are encouraged to keep a record of when they redeem prepaid meals, to avoid running out of meals. You will be notified when your balance drops below \$7.00.

Families may be eligible for free or reduced price meals. A new application must be completed each year. An application, instructions, and other information will come home with students on

Our School

Hayward Primary School is a great place for children to start their formal education. Our energetic, lively staff loves to have a lot of fun while providing hands-on, developmentally appropriate learning activities. Required Classes

Your child will be enrolled in a classroom of 18 students or less, with their core curriculum being taught by one teacher. Other classes your child will be taking at this level include: Art, Music, Phy.Ed, Computer Lab, Ojibwe Culture, and Library. We also offer intervention and enrichment programs with activities for all students.

Picking up Students at Dismissal:

Parents who pick up their children after school are asked to wait for them in the gym. Parents are not allowed in our hallways or at classroom doors at the end of the day until all students have been safely dismissed. This will ensure that all students have a safe and orderly dismissal.

Hayward 4 Learning: Community Collaboration Program

All children who are four on or before September 1 may apply to attend the Hayward 4 Learning Voluntary Community Collaboration Program. The goal of our four-year-old program is to create an environment which stimulates creativity, promotes age appropriate learning experiences, and builds social skills for all children. Four-year-old students must present certification of birth, immunization records, social security numbers, verification of physical address and provide current medical physical examination documentation.

Required Classes

Classes are set-up on a block schedule for students in the high school. There are four periods a day, each period being ninety minutes. A minimum of 28 credits are required to graduate from Hayward High School. These credits must include:

4 credits in English – including 1/2 credit of Speech

3 credits in Social Science- including 1/2 credit of Civics

3 credits in Mathematics

3 credits in Science

1-1/2 credits in Physical Education – must be $\frac{1}{2}$ credit of Health Education is required in 9th Grade

1/2 credit of Financial Literacy required.

HACIL is a year-round virtual charter school which functions as a center for the support, oversight, assistance and accountability of student's who's families wish to participate in formulating an individual education plan for their child. HACIL utilizes technology as well as traditional methods in developing a tailored educational plan for each student.

HACIL is a multi-site, blended education experience with both home studies and enrichment classes offered. HACIL students may take up to two general education classes per quarter in addition to participating in the Hayward Community School District's cocurricular activities including sports.

Hayward Charter School and Virtual School students are allowed to participate in all of the district's co-curricular and athletic events.

Hayward K-12 Virtual Program


Child Find Notice

Upon request, the Hayward Community School District is required to evaluate a child for eligibility for special education services. A request for evaluation is known as referral. When the district receives a referral, the district will appoint an Individualized Education Program (IEP) team to determine if the child has a disability and if the child needs special education services. The district locates, identifies and evaluates all children with disabilities who are enrolled by their parents in private (including religious) schools, elementary schools and secondary schools located in the school district.

A physician, nurse, psychologist, social worker, or administrator of a social agency who reasonably believes a child brought to him or her for services is a child with a disability has a legal duty to refer the child. This includes referring a homeless child to the school district in which the child resides. Before referring the child, the person making the referral must inform the child's parent that the referral will be made.

Others, including parents, who reasonably believe a child is a child with a disability may also refer the child. This includes a homeless child to the school district in which the child resides.

Referrals must be in writing and include the reason why the person believes the child has a disability. A referral may be made by contacting Carol Lynn Wheelock-Mashlan, Director of Pupil Services and Special Education at 715-638-9002. It is the policy of the Hayward Community School District that no person, on the basis of race, sex, color, gender, religion, national origin, ancestry, creed, pregnancy, marital or parental status, sexual orientation, or physical, mental, emotional, learning disability or handicap as required by s 118.13, WI State Statutes may be denied admission to any school in this District or be denied participation in any curricular, extra curricular, pupil services, recreational, or other programs or activities.

This policy also prohibits discrimination under related federal statues, including Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (race, national origin, color), Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 (gender), Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (handicap), and American Disabilities Act of 1990 (disability).

The District encourages informal resolution of complaints under this policy. However, a formal complaint resolution procedure is available to address allegations of violations of the policy in the Hayward Community School District.

Education of Homeless

Parents Right to Know

No Child Left Behind gives parents the right to request and receive timely information on the professional qualifications of their children's classroom teachers. School Districts must report:

*Whether the teacher has met state qualifying and licensing criteria for the grade levels and subject areas in which the teacher is teaching;

*Whether the teacher is teaching under emergency or other provisional status through which state qualification of licensing criteria have been waived;

*The baccalaureate degree major of the teacher and any other graduate certification or degree held by the teacher, including the field of discipline of the certification or degree; and

*Whether the child is provided services by para-professionals and, if so, their qualifications.

In addition, if a child is assigned, or taught by a teacher who is not "highly qualified" for four or more consecutive weeks, the parents must receive timely notice.
