**MINUTES**

**Dennis White opened the meeting with a prayer.**

1. **Call to Order** – Meeting was called to order at 4:20 P.M.

2. **Agenda Update** – There was a request to add the meeting times. The approval of the agenda was motioned by Dan VanderVeldon and Linda Plante seconds the motion.
3. **Approval of Minutes**- Motion made by Linda Plante to approve of December 2017 minutes and Dan VanderVeldon seconds the motion.
4. **Home School Coordinators' Reports** –

5. **Title VI Report** – Doug Stark said that there is three parts to the grant and the first part of the grant opens towards the end of the month. There is roughly \$230 per student and roughly 560 students throughout K-12<sup>th</sup> grade. This year it is expected that we will end up \$7k short and the school is looking to IEPAC for direction of continued support. IEPAC has agreed to continue do what we are currently doing with the money.
6. **Superintendent's Report** – summarized his report (attached). Craig Olson asked if the JOM tutors should attend the meeting and give a report. Karen Breit said that we can ask them to be present and it is important but Tribal Government should have that conversation and make that call.

10. **Announcement:** Dan VanderVeldon stated that there have been meetings with LCOOCC for high school students to have the opportunity to take credits at the college. Right now they are in the process of taking the next step and next year the 7<sup>th</sup> Generation Scholarship will be available. Dan VanderVeldon also said that they are trying to set up a mentorship program with current LCOOCC college students to help struggling high school students. It was also noted that Wrestling will begin in February.

<b>STUDENT CONTACTS</b>	I had 53 student/family contacts since our last IEPAC Meeting.
<b>IEP MEETINGS</b>	I did not attend any IEP Meetings during this time.
<b>JOM TUTOR REQUESTS</b>	The Hayward Middle School continues to offer academic support to our students through Mrs. Hagar within our Alternative Learning Academic Center, Mrs. Teran Aide-Academic Coach, and Ms. Turnbull MS Aide- Academic Coach. The Middle School also continues to provide the After School Tutoring Program from 3:30 p.m. to 4:45p.m. Mon.-Thurs., with transportation being provided to the LCO Boys & Girls Club. Please do not hesitate to call the school if you would like to use one of these resources for your child for additional academic support.

<b>TRANSPORTS</b>	I made 12 home-visits and transported 4 students.
<b>SST MEETINGS/AT-RISK MEETINGS</b>	SST Meetings/At-Risk Meetings continue to be set up by Administration. Meetings are conducted with each grade level to update data on student progress quarterly. These measures are taken to provide adequate services to our students before making any referrals for EEN Services and for student success. I would like to remind the parents/guardians that each grade level team of teachers are available to meet with parents/guardians on a needed basis for any concern for their child throughout the school year. The 6 <sup>th</sup> Grade Team meets daily at 11:00a.m., the 7 <sup>th</sup> Grade Team meets daily at 2:00p.m., and the 8 <sup>th</sup> Grade Team meets daily at 9:00a.m. Please do not hesitate to contact the school if you have any concerns or would like to schedule a team meeting.
<b>ATTENDANCE/TRUANCY</b>	I continue to work closely with the Middle School Office and Administration to monitor school attendance for our students. The students and parents/guardians are doing a great job in verifying and providing documentation for absences. I strongly encourage our parents/guardians to continue with this communication to avoid any truancy issues. I would also like to remind our parents/guardians to keep a close eye on attendance as we are now coming to the end of 1 <sup>st</sup> Semester and some of our students have used all their excused days. Remember to use pre-arranged absences when you know your child will be absent ahead of time.

The tribe along with the county and the state are continuing to take the measures needed to address this serious health concern within our community. The Hayward Community School Board passed a resolution at the last school board meeting to have more counseling</p>

<b>JOM TUTOR REQUESTS</b>	I have not submitted any referrals for JOM Tutoring to Liz Thayer since the last meeting. <b>ATTENDANCE</b>	<p>We are closely monitoring attendance for unexcused absences. Families are receiving a notification letter when a student has three unexcused absences. If a student reaches the fifth unexcused absence, families receive a notification for a meeting which is held at the school. The meeting will include the truancy officer, principal, and parent/guardian.</p> <p>We take in consideration medical absence, pre-arranged, and validated family emergencies.</p> <p>On Thursday January 12<sup>th</sup> I have four Truancy Meetings with the guardians, the school principal, truancy officer, and myself. To discuss the student has reached their limit of excused absences for the year and discussing the importance of having the student be here every day.</p>
